


Project Background

Vision: to create the first forest in Scotland that is co-designed, led and governed by young people.

Mission: to create and regenerate native Scottish forests, which are accessible to all, and utilised as an educational resource while combatting the climate and nature emergencies.

- Partnership: Young Scot, YouthLink Scotland, Woodland Trust, Green Action Trust
- Launched in February 2021
- Codesign panel of 19 young people aged 11 26 years old from across Scotland
- Supported by a National Expert Advisory Group











Ambitions

Land Use: To manage, regenerate and rewild various areas of land as forest sanctuaries

Health and Wellbeing: To create outdoor spaces for people to reconnect with nature: places to enjoy for their own health and wellbeing or to share with others

Native Wildlife: To manage and restore native wildlife to help educate and reconnect people with native species

Equality and Accessibility: To create welcoming forested places that are inviting and accessible for everyone

Culture and Innovation: To create inspiring natural spaces for people to explore the connectedness of natural and cultural heritage through arts and technology both ancient and modern

Young People: To enable and empower other young people to take action on issues of climate change and environmental concern













Blueprint

- A blueprint for future sites and activity across Scotland. Created by the Youth Leadership Panel.
- Guidelines, ambitions and decision-making tools, co-designed by young people, which set out the ethos and vision that they hope organisations will work in line with to create their own spaces and activities for Scotland's Young People's Forest across Scotland.
- Includes:
 - What is Meaningful Youth Participation?
 - Decision-making as Part of Scotland's Young People's Forest
 - Definitions of Minor, Intermediate and Major Decisions and how young people should be involved
 - Ambitions the Panel have developed ambitions to guide the programme and any future activity to ensure this continues to meet the needs of young people and align to their vision.
